The Royal Horticultural Society's Banksian Medal is awarded by Affiliated Societies such as the WHAS to the exhibitor awarded the highest number of points in the Horticultural Show Classes 7 – 51. This prestigious medal is named after Joseph Banks, who was a founder of the RHS. He also sailed with Captain James Cook on HMS Endeavour.

Please note that any competitor who has won the Banksian medal at the Society's shows in the last 2 years is not eligible to win the medal this year.

#### GENERAL RULES AND GUIDANCE SECTION

- 1. Exhibits may be staged from 9.30am onwards on the Saturday immediately prior to the Show's Opening on Bank Holiday Sunday. All exhibit set-up *must* be completed by 1.30pm. Late entries may not be accepted.
- 2. Judging will commence at 2.30pm Bank Holiday Saturday, promptly.
- 3. Entrants' identities will not be visible to judges until all awards have been made.
- 4. Early entries notification would be appreciated. Entry applications received after 6pm on the Thursday immediately prior to the Show may only be accepted subject to the WHAS's discretion.
- 5. Entries must be sent to: Helen Pearson (see page 3).
- 6. Class numbers must be clearly marked on all entries submitted.
- 7. Wherever possible, the varieties of entries in all classes should be named.
- 8. Exhibitors' entries must match those stated on their entry form or risk disqualification.
- 9. Any exhibitors' objections are to be lodged with a Show Official by 12 noon on Sunday accompanied by a £1 deposit, returnable if the objection is upheld.
- 10. If insufficient entries are received in any one Class, the associated awards will be at the Show Judges' discretion.
- 11. Show competitors must have grown their exhibits. This is subject to verification by the Committee. Exceptions are classes 1-6; 52-57; 59-62; 64-67, which must have been made/constructed by the competitor.
- 12. The use of Oasis or similar non-environmentally friendly products is not permitted.
- 13. Exhibitors are restricted to one entry in each Class.
- 14. For pot and tray sizes given in Metric units, close Imperial sizes are acceptable.
- 15. The Show closes to the public 4pm August Bank Holiday Monday. Competitors' exhibits are not to be removed before 4pm.
- 16. The WHAS and its Committee will not accept liability for loss or damage to exhibits or personal belongings.
- 17. Contingencies not covered in this booklet are to be referred to the WHAS for consideration, however, their decision/ruling is final.
- 18. All trophies must be signed for immediately after presentation and returned to the WHAS on or before 1<sup>st</sup> July the following year.
- 19. Prize monies not claimed by the close on Bank Holiday Monday will be regarded as a donation to the WHAS unless other arrangements for collection are made by the exhibitor.

#### **TOP VASE (Class 22)**

- 1. The Top Vase is for a vase of mixed flowers containing a total of between 5 and 12 stems, taken from a minimum of three different plant genera.
- 2. The display will be judged from a total of 35 points. 25 maximum for colour, form, condition, quality and freshness plus a possible 10 points awarded for overall presentation and effect. To be viewed through 360°.
- 3. Stems used in the display must be showing flowers only. Seed heads, berries etc. are not allowed. Foliage which is growing naturally, is attached to and forms part of the flowering stem is allowed.
- 4. The vase may be any shape or size and made of any material, but must be proportionate to the display. No marks are awarded for the vase.
- 5. Accessories such as bows or additional foliage are not allowed. Environmentally friendly packing material may be used to support the stems.

#### **NOTES FOR EXHIBITORS AND JUDGES**

- Flowering stems can be taken from ANY flowering plant. Plants need to be taken from different genera – e.g. Pinks, Carnations and Sweet Williams, which are all dianthus, are not classed as different genera.
- 2. Only fresh, home-grown flowers may be used. Dried or silk flowers are not allowed.
- 3. The definition of a vase is any vessel that can be used to hold cut flowers which is taller than it is wide at its widest point.
- 4. TOP VASE is open for anyone to enter and is not intended purely for growers who regularly display single species classes at shows. Judges will use their discretion, bearing in mind that entries may be from inexperienced exhibitors. Judges should note the display must be viewed from all around. Points must be clearly marked by the judges on the exhibitor's card.
- 5. Queries not covered by the rules above will be referred to and decided by the Show Officials. Failure to comply with Rules will result in disqualification.

#### **TOP TRAY (Class 46)**

- Top Tray Class is for a display comprising of any three types of vegetables taken from the list of eight below, along with their respective quantities in the following brackets:
  - Carrots (3), Cauliflower (2), Onions (3), Parsnips (3), Peas (6 pods), Potatoes (3), Runner Beans (6), and Tomatoes (6).
- 2. Each type of vegetable will be judged out of a total of 20 points, split into three sections: 7 points for size, shape and colour; 7 points for condition and 6 points for uniformity. Therefore, overall marks will be out of 60.
- 3. All vegetables are to be displayed for effect. Vegetables are to be displayed within an area not exceeding 45 x 60cm without bending any parts. No parts of the exhibit may exceed the size of this footprint. A tray or board may be used provided it does not exceed the size area limits. If a tray or board being used has a raised edge the internal dimension is used to measure the size. Black cloth is permitted, and the tray may be painted. Parsley is allowed for garnishing but no other foliage. Accessories such as plates, sand and rings etc. will be allowed. Onion tops may be tied or whipped using raffia or string.

#### **NOTES FOR EXHIBITORS AND JUDGES**

- Carrots and Parsnips must have their foliage trimmed back to 7.5cm. Peas and Beans
  must be displayed with some stalk attached. Tomatoes must be displayed with
  calyces (the green flower's bed case). Judges may handle exhibits, open pods etc. to
  check quality. The tray/board or staging must not be cut or mutilated in any way,
  e.g. cutting holes to hold onions.
- 2. Judges may use their discretionary powers when marking if they consider exhibits may be from the inexperienced.
- 3. Points awarded are to be clearly marked by judges on the exhibitor's card. Queries arising that are not covered in the foregoing must be passed promptly to the Show Officials for their decision.
- 4. Queries not covered by the rules above will be referred to and decided by the Show Officials. Failure to comply with Rules will result in disqualification.

#### THE WHAS CHALLENGE PRIZE (Class 100)

- The WHAS Growers' Challenge Prize is open to any group of exhibitors from an
  existing single allotment site, or a charity, gardening organisation or similar
  horticultural group. The group shall be named on the entry form. A group leader
  must be nominated who will be responsible for the overall entry and to whom any
  prize money will be paid for the group.
- 2. Prize monies will be awarded under the following conditions:
  - The first prize will be £100 only if there are five or more entries in the class, £30 if there are three or four entries and £20 if fewer than three entries;
  - The second prize will be £30 only if there are five or more entries in the class, £20 if there are three or four entries and £10 if there are two entries;
  - The third prize will be £20 only if there are five or more entries in the class and £10 if there are three or four entries.
    - i.e. the value of the prizes awarded will depend on the number of entries
- 3. The entry shall consist of a Show Bench of Harvest Produce (any vegetables / flowers / herbs / fruit / home produce). The exhibit stand / bench's footprint must not exceed 90cm wide x 75cm deep. The Show Bench may be covered in cloth or painted, at the exhibitor's discretion, and may have raised edges. Accessories such as plates, sand and rings will be allowed.
- 4. The entrant's identity shall not be displayed on the exhibit.
- 5. Innovation and creativity are to be encouraged, and the points awarded will reflect this.
- 6. The number and variety of produce items to be displayed is not limited, but all must be contained completely within the footprint as above.
- 7. Onion tops may be tied or whipped using raffia or string. Peas and beans shall be displayed with some stalk attached, tomatoes with calyces and soft fruit with stalks, unless there are reasons in the overall exhibit design that makes this undesirable.
- 8. Judging will be made by a judges' panel. Up to 60 points may be awarded for the entry at the judges' discretion: 20 for the variety and / or choices of produce; 20 for the condition, presentation, quality and (where relevant) uniformity; 20 for the creativity shown in the display design.


#### **VICTORIA SPONGE RECIPE** – *for Guidance only*

Ingredients: 3 medium eggs 150g (6oz) self-raising flour (sieved)

150g (6oz) caster sugar 150g (6oz) butter or margarine Jam to fill (quantities to fill two 20cm tins)

Cream the butter and sugar together until light and fluffy. In a separate bowl, beat the eggs well. Gradually add the beaten eggs to the creamed butter and sugar, 1/3 of the egg mixture at a time alternated with 1 tbsp of the sieved self-raising flour, to prevent the mixture from curdling.

Cut and fold in the remainder of the flour. The mixture should be of a soft dropping consistency. If it is too dry add a little milk or water. Divide the mixture equally between 2 greased/lined baking tins and bake in a pre-heated oven (180°C/Gas Mk.4) for 20 to 25 minutes until golden, risen and lightly springing back to the touch. Once cooled, sandwich together with jam (no cream).
